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### ABOUT THE CAST

MAGGIE AFFELDER (Phoebe de Burgh) is new to Ann Arbor Civic Theatre. At Trinity College she played Mary MacGregor in *The Prime of Miss Jean Brodie* and Mrs. Drudge in *The Real Inspector General*, and with the Ann Arbor Actor's Ensemble, she played Tina in *The Abdication*. Maggie has just received her B.A. from the University of Michigan with a major in Psychology, and plans to attend Ohio University's Professional Actor Training Program this fall.

RICHARD M. ATWATER (Phillip) is appearing in his first role with Ann Arbor Civic Theatre. Previously he has played Tom Stoppard in *The Real Inspector Hound* at Huron High School and Lord Montague in *Romeo and Juliet* at Kalamazoo College. Richard has had extensive technical experience working in lights, set construction and special effects at Kalamazoo College, where he is a student majoring in theatre and physics.

LISA BERKI (Colleen) was seen as Mercy Lewis in Civic Theatre's production of *The Crucible*. She has also played the parlor maid in *Pygmalion*, Gina in *Flowers for Algernon* and Jenny in *The Prime of Miss Jean Brodie* with Pioneer Theatre Guild, and has acted in three segments of the U of M video T.V. production of *A Midlife Crisis*. Lisa serves as an advisory member to the Young People's Theatre, and to the Friends of the Library Committee. She is an eleventh grader at Pioneer High School.

CHRISTOPHER FLYNN (Humphry Humphries) is making his fourth appearance in AACT's Fiftieth Anniversary Season. He played Vincent in Follies, Lawyer Hawkins in The Devil's Disciple and Thomas Putnam in The Crucible. As a young man, Christopher worked for ten years in New York City as dancer-actor-singer appearing in ballet, modern dance, opera, theatre, musical comedy, children's theatre, radio, television and night clubs. In the early sixties, he was a resident player at Vanguard Playhouse in Detroit. He has also worked 'the other side of the lights' chiefly in administration and direction, most notable as executive assistant to the director of the Joffrey Ballet, and as producer and artistic director of his own touring company, The Christopher Ballet. He is currently a faculty member in the University of Michigan Dance Department and is also ballet master for the Detroit City Dance Company.

ED GLAZIER(Sir Hubert Lambert) has played Ali Hakim in Oklahoma!, Jeff Douglas in Brigadoon, and parts in Carousel, Thurber's Carnival, Pygmalion, and Ernest in Love with AACT. He has also played Bunthorne in Patience with Gilbert and Sullivan, Bellomy in Fantasticks with the Arbecol Theatrics, and Albert in Bye, Bye Birdie with the Crosswell Opera House. Ed is the head of serials cataloging at the University of Michigan Librarys.

**TIMOTHY R. HENNING** (Basil Moreton) recently appeared as Judge Hathorne in *The Crucible* with AACT, and as the writer in the studio production of *The Good Doctor*. He appeared in numerous high school plays in Fremont, Ohio; in *The Seagull* at Edgecliff Columbia College in New York City, and toured with the San Diego Repertory. Tim is a lab technician and enjoys acting, directing and writing.

SHERIDAN HUNT (Lady Letitia Lambert) was first in *Mame* with AACT as a member of the chorus. She has also played Maggie Anderson in *Brigadoon* with AACT and designed costumes for *You Never Can Tell*. Sheri has worked professionally with True Grist, Ltd. Dinner Theatre in Homer, Michigan, played Bella Manningham in *Gaslight* and Hope Langdon in *Something's Afoot*; and with Six Flags Showcase at Magic Mountain in Valencia, California as a Dazzlette. Sheri graduated from Eastern Michigan University with a theatre major and biology minor. She works at the Outpatient Neurology Clinic at U Hospital.

JIM KANE (Uncle Willie) appeared last season as the Deaf Mute in *The Madwoman of Chaillot* and the Carpenter in *The Good Person of Szechwan*. He has also appeared in *Mousetrap, Fantasticks, Rose Tattoo, Black Comedy, Brass and Grass Forever, Arsenic and Old Lace* and *Spofford*. Jim is a reporter for <a href="The-Ann Arbor">The Ann Arbor</a> News and enjoys tennis, bowling and softball.

JOSHUA McGOWAN (Andy) has done a series of plays ranging from Father Knows Best, to Up the Down Staircase in Junior and Senior High School. He played several parts in a production at the Ann Arbor Inn in A Funny Thing Happened on the way to the Forum. Josh has also been in All My Sons and Feiffers People. He is presently taking a year off of school before continuing his education.

LARRY PETERS (Harry) has previous experience at the Barn Theatre at Oakland University in *The Boom Boom Room*. He is a junior at the University of Michigan studying elementary education and and working as an apprentice carpenter. This summer he will be teaching at the Bear Pole Ranch in Colorado, hiking, orienteering, rock climbing and kayaking in the Colorado Rockies. He is studying and playing jazz guitar at WCC.

BURNETTE STAEBLER (Honora Griffin Moreton) has appeared in Civic Theatre's productions of Follies, Tartuff, Mame, Missalliance, and Once Upon a Mattress, and has directed Kiss Me Kate, The Lion In Winter, Antigone, Ernest in Love and Cactus Flower amoung others. Burnette is a former board member and president of Ann Arbor Civic Theatre, and enjoys writing music, singing and needlepoint.

### ABOUT THE STAFF

STEVE REYNOLDS (Director) has recently directed for the University of Michigan Theatre Department Ah, Wilderness!, In Celebration and Two Gentlemen of Verona. Steve Directed Brigadoon for Civic Theatre, which won the Best Musical Award. He has worked with the Playwrighting class in the English Department at U of M directing original plays and will do so again this fall. Steve is a Ph. D. student and teaching assistant in acting and directing and has recently begun working on his dissertation.

DON STEWART (Co-set Designer). Seldom does an amateur set designer have the opportunity to design a new play. He has been blessed twice. Two years ago *The Zoo Keeper* by Carol Duffy, and now, *Lady Lambert*. This show has three acts and three different settings. He hopes you like the way JoAnn and he accomplished the transition. This is Don's twenty-fifth set design, recently designing the set for *The Curious Savage*.

**JoANN ZEIGENFUSE** (Co-set Designer) moved to Ann Arbor from Pennsylvania about 1½ years ago. She worked on costumes and set painting in a summer theatre group and has now joined AACT helping on set painting for *The Crucible* and *The Curious Savage*. JoAnn taught art in public schools in Pennsylvania, and now is an artist for a local firm.

SHERADI DAUN COLLINS CANNON (Costume Designer) is designing her first show for Civic Theatre. She has designed costumes for *The Lion and The Jewel, She Stoops to Conquer, Getting Married* and *Two Gentlemen of Verona* with the University of Michigan Theatre Department, were she received her Masters in Fine Art. Sheradi works at Lucky Drugs Costume, and is going to design costumes for Michigan Summer Reportory production of *Blithe Spirit*.

BRAD BUTLER (Lighting Designer) has designed lights for Kiss Me Kate and The Madwoman of Chaillot and will be the lighting designer for the up-coming production of Guys and Dolls for AACT. Most recently he created the lighting for The Pirates of Penzance following Iolanthe, HMS Pinafore, and Princess Ida, for the U of M G & S Society. Additional designs have included La Boheme and the Son of Getron for the U of M School of Music, La Perichole and The Gypsy Baron for the Comic Opera Guild, and The Fantasticks for Curtis Productions. After designing two repertory seasons for the Berkeley Shakespeare Festival in California, Brad created the lighting for the 1978 season at Detroit's Attic Theatre, which included the Michigan premieres of Angel City and The Shadow Box and five other plays.

**CONNIE McCARTHY** (Assistant Director and Properties) worked on make-up, ushering and set building for AACT, and did properties for the recent production of *The Crucible*. She is a part-time stockkeeper at Mott Children's Hospital, and part-time student at EMU, working towards an occupational therapy degree.

LINDA MILNE (Make-up Designer) is a senior in vocal performance at the University of Michigan School of Music, and has a strong interest in technical theatre. She won the "75 Award" for outstanding technical achievement with Pioneer Theatre's Guild, and has done make-up for Comic Opera Guild, School of Music Opera, and Civic Theatre.

JOHN FISHER(Stage Manager) was the producer for Kiss Me Kate with AACT and the producer for the Saline Area Players production of The Sound of Music, and is on the Board of Directors of that organization. His stage experience includes Curly in Oklahoma!, Charlie Dalrumple in Brigadoon, Sid in Pajama Game and as a chorus member in Fiddler on the Roof and Mame. John is a consultant engineer presently under contract to the Environmental Research Institute.

BARBARA CARRON (Producer) was stage manager for the recent production of *The Crucible*, and Assistant Director and played the Script Girl in AACT's production of *Kiss Me Kate*. Barb is the program editor and membership records keeper for Civic Theatre, and works as a secretary at Campus Management, Inc.

DIANE J. A. MONACH (Playwright) is a student in the M.F.A. program in costume design at the University of Michigan, where she recently designed costumes for *The Relapse* and previously for *Red Roses for Me.* Daine has designed costumes for *Brigadoon* and *Waltz of the Toreadors* for AACT, and *Cinderella* and *Thousand Clowns* for M.M. Productions. She did her M.A. Thesis Show at EMU on *The Prince, The Wolf and the Firebird.* Diane has not only won the Hopwood Award in Playwriting for *Lady Lambert* but has previously won the award in 1978 for *Fanny's Jewels*.

It is a great honor to receive an award in the Avery Hopwood and Jule Hopwood Contest. Such an award recognizes a literary merit and quality in their work that all writers like to have acknowledged. However, a play is never fully realized until it is produced. Plays, by the nature of the medium, are static unless brought to life by actors. Therefore, to have a play produced is an ambition of which all aspiring playwrights dream. For this reason, I am very happy that Ann Arbor Civic Theatre chose to do my show as part of this year's season.

There is a process in doing an original script that is different from other theatrical ventures and is particularly exciting to the actor as well as the writer. For example, with Lady Lambert, the script has undergone major surgery in many spots. A major character and two of the subplots were cut along the way. I was told by a creative writing teacher in high school that great writers do not write, they re-write. Being ignorant and optimistic, I thought that if one were truly great, one could produce great works off the top of one's head. I have since come to the conclusion that my teacher was closer to the truth.

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### The 1980-1981 Playbill

You will note on the facing page the announcement for Ann Arbor Civic Theatre's Playbill for the 1980-1981 season. Even though the current season is not ended, in fact at this very moment, production efforts and rehearsals are underway for the final production of the 1979-1980 season - Guys and Dolls,

to be presented on June 18 through June 22.

Why the rush to announce the playbill for AACT's 51st season? Quite frankly, we could not wait. We are excited and thrilled at the choice of plays we are offering to you, our constant Theatre patrons, and to the Ann Arbor community at large. We wanted to share with you our excitement and delight for what is in store for you, our audience. It is more than just a list of titles and dates, it is a culmination of a great deal of careful consideration of feed-back from your comments, suggestions, criticisms, and the shared experiences between you, the theatre goer, and us, the producers and performers.

AACT opens its 1980-1981 season with the latest Broadway comedy hit, Alan Ayckbourn's Bedroom Farce, on September 24. This show has just been released for production and will be given its first presentation in Ann Arbor. It is a delightful modern English social light comedy by a newly established

master of humor, who resembles Neil Simon's American appeal and popularity.

The December offering of *The Water Engine* is a play by an author widely heralded as this country's best new playwright. David Mamet has already made his mark with other works of powerfully stark drama dealing with contemporary issues. In *The Water Engine*, we witness the experience that an innovative and creative genius undergoes when his unique invention, an engine which runs on water, is offered to the public.

For a choice of one of the finest and most memorable musicals ever, the lavishness of lyrics, music, plot and characters that can possibly be combined in one production, can there be any better choice than Lerner and Loewe's My Fair Lady! This show has not been performed by a major theatre group in Ann Arbor in quite some time. So beloved and appealing is this show that AACT will present My Fair Lady

on two successive week-ends, January 8-10 and January 17-20.

Everyone has heard of *East Lynne*, but no one has ever seen it. Everyone knows that it has been in continuous performance in England for over 27 years, but rarely has it even been seen in this country. Quite simply, it is the most popular melodrama ever written, where style and character has never been matched in excellence. It is the true melodrama, not at all to be confused with the plethora of "Mellerdrama" that proliferatively, but unsuccessfully, followed in its wake. *East Lynne*, to be presented on March 4-7, offers a complete contrast in style and experience for the theatre-goer.

George Faydeau is regarded as the very best playwright of French farce, and A Flea in Her Ear is one of his most endearing and enduring works. Using the conventions of manners, double identities, and mix-up of identities and intentions to the fullest, a grand parade of humble and exotic characters churn up and down stairs and in and out of doors in this classic example of frantic chase and romp amoung high society Paris of the early 1900's. A Flea in Her Ear will delight you and tickle your funny bone on April 22-25.

The 1980-1981 season will end with the production of Thorton Wilder's *Our Town*, on June 27-30. While few may claim to have seen *East Lynne*, everyone is acquainted with this play, adjudged to be the greatest American drama ever written. AACT's choice of *Our Town* is deliberate and conscionable; it is a play of such emphatic statement of the experience of life and death that has not been equalled, nor has it always been given the mature artistry in performance it deserves. It's wide range of ages and character types, its explicit sounding of two compelling universal themes remain an ultimate challenge to production and audience alike.

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












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
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
