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From the Director

The first question I was asked after proposing that Shakespeare's A Midsummer Night's Dream be set in ancient Baghdad was, "Why?" I'll get to that answer in a moment. The second was, "What about all the stuff in the forest, do they even have woods in the Middle East?"

In many ways the second question answers the first. Sort of. Maybe not why I chose Shakespeare, but rather the inspiration behind this project. With the world as it is now, with the strife and violence that plagues the Middle East (and our own country's participation) it's easy to forget what Baghdad once was and view it only as the tragedy it is today. But once upon time, the land between the Tigris and Euphrates (Dijla and Furat, in Arabic) was the cradle of civilization. It was the land of Scheherazade and The Arabian Nights and before that, Gilgamesh. There were cedar forests, riverbanks dense with trees and land that was renown for its fertile soil.

It is the dream of the Baghdad-that-was that inspires this production of *A Midsummer Night's Dream*. Set nearly a thousand years ago, our production sincerely hopes to evoke the vibrancy of a region once regarded as the cultural center of the world. In the time of Harun al Rashid, art, science, religion and literature prospered.

Reworking the characters and text, I have incorporated Babylonian legend along with the region's personalities, beliefs and culture to reflect the *Midsummer's* new setting. It is, admittedly, the work of an amateur but one I hope you'll find compelling. Even with the great Khalifah, Harun al Rashid to Enkidu and Shamhat (the bestial companion of Gilgamesh and his bride), Shakespeare's fantasy (and much of his story) remains intact but its sensibilities have been transformed.

To be honest, I chose *Midsummer* because it is, first a foremost, a tale of imagination, not history. In the realm of dreams anything can happen and so evocation seemed to be more important than translation. The Bard's use of Greek culture is, at best, a thin veneer for his fanciful examination of passionate expression and the madness of love. It is those themes that drew me to the project. Venturing into the wild his lovers, repressed by rigid rules of social conduct, experience their first taste of freedom... romantic and sexual. Whether it's the moral codes of Victorian society, the "sharp" laws of religious doctrine or the enforced behavior of a good "decent" folk, Shakespeare's tale of liberation --its virtues and pitfalls-- is poignantly universal.

It is a recognition of what makes us common that fuels tonight's performance. With each passing year our world gets smaller and our country becomes more diverse. Southeast Michigan, in particular, is home to some of the largest Middle-Eastern-American communities in the nation. I see a unique opportunity to reach out to these communities. Taking a cue from Shakespeare's use (some might say, misuse) of history and fantasy, this marriage of Anglo text to Middle Eastern culture is, I hope, a metaphor for how two communities can come together to create something unique and beautiful.

A Thumbnail Primer on Some of What You Will See and Hear

First, please, forget whatever you know of the traditional versions of *Midsummer* and surrender yourself to the heat, culture and passion of ancient Baghdad. Fairies become djinn, Puck (named for the Irish Pukka) is now Div and Titania is no longer the proud Greek immortal Shakespeare envisioned but rather Shamhat, disciple of Ashtar, goddess of passion and beauty. She tames Enkidu by making love to him not by waging war. Similarly, the mechanicals, originally dubbed with nonsensical names like Snout and Bottom, are saddled with monikers like Kebab, Samoon (a round of bread), Burut (moustache), Taboon (clay oven), Dishdasha (a robe) and Masoor (a type of lentil).

Second, Midsummer's play-within-a-play, Pyramus and Thisbe has been replaced *The Night Harun al Rashid Met Himself Upon The Water* as adapted by Mary Zimmerman. It is one of the many wonderful tales you can find in *A Thousand Nights And One Night* as translated by JC Mardrus and Powys Mathers and I am thrilled Ms. Zimmerman has allowed me to use her words. Though it changes the tone of the play's final act, I hope you will find its twisted tale of love and betrayal a good fit.

"Heidi and Bill" by Wilfred Kaplan

In 1936 Wilfred Kaplan had a traveling fellowship from Harvard University to pursue his career in mathematics. He enrolled at the Institute of Technology in Zurich and, on the first day of classes, found a seat next to the only girl in the class, Swiss-born Ida Roettinger (later nicknamed "Heidi"). A few weeks later he invited her to the grand student ball, which lasted from 9 p. m. till 5 a. m. During those eight hours they fell deeply in love, a love which was to last for over 68 years. It took almost two years for them to overcome the obstacles to getting

married, for Heidi's parents were strongly opposed. The story is told almost wholly in letters between the two lovers (translated from German by Wilfred). In reading it, one is inevitably drawn into the life of the historic times, when Hitler was threatening the world.

In April 1960, Pablo Casals conducted master classes in cello at the University of California in Berkeley. Ida Roettinger Kaplan, nicknamed "Heidi," traveled from Ann Arbor, along with her cello teacher, Harry Dunscombe, to attend the classes as auditor. Harry was one of the students in the master class. Heidi wrote letters to her family, describing all her experiences. The present pamphlet reproduces those letters in edited form. They convey the spirit of the remarkable occasion and supplement the comments made in the appendix to Heidi's book Head, Hand, and Heart [published under her maiden name Ida Roettinger in 1970, distributed by Shar Music Co. in Ann Arbor]. The 1960 Casals Master Classes in Berkeley is an Episode in the Lives of "Heidi and Bill".

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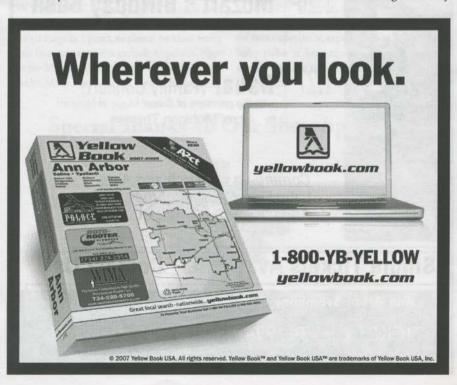
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The Production Staff
