Notes about the Director and Cast

DONALD C. LOVEL (Director) an instructor in the Speech Department, directed "Mr. Roberts" and "The Crucible" for Civic Theatre this season, and has directed University Players productions of "My Three Angels" and "Rashomon."

LOIS OUELLETTE (Penelope) has been in Civic Theatre for many years and has appeared in their productions of "The Diary of Anna Frank" and "The Flowering Peach." She just finished directing a play for the March of Dimes Benefit at Whitmore Lake. WILLIAM TAYLOR (Lionel Toop) appeared in this year's first production "Under the Yum-Yum Tree." This will be his thirteenth performance for Civic Theatre. He has received oscars twice in past years for his performances.

FRED OUELLETTE (Clive) has been a member of the Board of Directors for three years. He has been in many Civic Theatre productions and received oscar awards for his performances in "Major Barbara," "The Flowering Peach," and "Mr. Roberts." He is a salesman for Rollform, Inc. of Ann Arbor.

WILLIAM STOKES (Bishop of Lax) is appearing for the first time with Civic Theatre, but was in the University Players production of "Rashamon." He is a librarian at the University General Library.

JACK O'BRIEN (Reverend Arthur Humphrey) is making his second appearance with us (his first being in the Musical "Wonderful Town"). He wrote "Bartholomew Fair" and "Land-Ho" for the Musket Productions and "A Matter of Style" for the University Players. He is an instructor in the University Speech Department.

SANFORD COHEN (Sergeant Towers) played the part of the first English Baron in "Becket" earlier this year. He is a graduate student at the University in the Department of Nuclear Engineering.

J. B. BULLOCK (The Intruder) also appeared in the production of "Becket" earlier this year. He is reactor supervisor at the Phoenix Memorial Laboratory at the University.
