#### NOTES ABOUT THE DIRECTOR AND CAST

TOM MANNING (Director)—directing his first Civic Theatre show, graduated from the University of Detroit and has done his graduate work at the University of Michigan where he is presently working on a doctorate in theatre. He is Business Manager of the University Players and was in their productions of "Queen and The Rebels," "A Servant of Two Masters," and "Madwoman of Chaillot."

ANDI NAVARRO (First Soldier)—a U of M student, has played many roles, including Rodolfo in "A View From The Bridge" (in Spanish, his native language) while at the University of Havana. He was a dancer in our earlier production of "Oklahoma!" and will be doing summer stock in the East before going to New York and his first love—musical comedy.

CLAN CRAWFORD, JR. (Second Soldier)—also a member of our "Oklahoma!" cast, is an Ann Arbor attorney, a former member of the City Council, a past-president of Civic Theatre, and one of our long-standing, hard-working Old Timers.

MICHAEL ROSS (The General)—seen earlier this season as <u>Peter</u> in "A Taste of Honey," will be leaving in June for a six week tour of the country before returning to his home in Leeds, England. He has been an active member in his year with Civic Theatre and we return him to the Leeds Civic Theatre with much regret.

JOHN RAE (Hooper Moulsworth)—is obviously "hooked" on grease paint. This is his 19th Civic Theatre role and he was in two 1963 Drama Season productions. He is a local attorney, member of County Board of Supervisors, Secretary-Treasurer of the Drama Season and a past-president of Civic Theatre.

ZEKE JABBOUR (Vadim Romanoff)—the third past-president in tonight's cast, has been in many Civic Theatre shows—the first (also his first on any stage) was as Papa Frank in "The Diary of Anne Frank" and the most recent was as the Pope in "Becket." He also refers to himself as "Cook Extraordinaire" these days since the appearance of a certain story in the Ann Arbor News.

JOHN HABER (Romanoff)—played the role of Geoffrey in "A Taste of Honey." He started acting as a child and has appeared in some 37 productions—a number which will increase this summer when he does a season of summer stock. In his spare time he is writing a musical.

KATHLEEN THOMPSON (Juliet)—was in last year's musical "Threepenny Opera." She is a student at the University where she was seen in "Bye, Bye, Birdie"—to name one of many—and also appeared in the Drama Season production of "Pal Joey."

JEROME PATTERSON (The Spy)—Managing Editor of The Education Digest, has been active in either organizing, running, or acting in community theatre groups throughout Michigan (Twin Cities, Port Huron, Muskegon, Ludington). He is President of our Board of Directors and was last seen as the <a href="Preacher">Preacher</a> in "Threepenny Opera."

BETH TRUE (Beulah Moulsworth)—received Best Actress Award for her performance in 1955 in "The Curious Savage" and was last seen in "The Grass Harp." Now serving for the second time on our Board of Directors she also qualifies as an Old Timer (10 years or more of active work).

AILEEN MENGEL (Evdokia Romanoff)—came to Civic Theatre after 10 years of acting and directing with the Ridgedale Players. She was seen last season in "The Grass Harp" and is the director of our Acting Workshop.

BARBARA SIMPSON (Marfa)—is a newcomer to Civic Theatre, appearing for the first time tonight. She has spent five years in summer theatre in Western Michigan and Illinois appearing in productions too numerous to mention and will be doing another season of summer theatre this year.

JAMES HARRIS (Freddie)—another Civic Theatre first-timer, is a senior at Ann Arbor High School where he is Captain of their renowned Debate Team.

KINGSBURY MARZOLF (The Archbishop)—an architect, is an Instructor in Architecture at the University of Michigan. He first performed at the age of 5 in Chicago and continued acting through Junior College. This, his first appearance in 15 years is also his first for Civic Theatre.
