

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

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From the Director

I'm really excited to share the world of this play with you at this performance. And I think that from the moment you see the opening number (yes, there's an opening number!), you'll realize that this is not a traditional approach. As Americans, I feel it is our duty to approach Shakespeare not by a 400 year old history to which we can't relate, but by our own uniquely American history.

By setting the play in New York in the 1930's, I have tried to examine the play's central theme of human refinement versus human nature. I've placed the play in and around Central Park, where nature and refinement are literally across the street from each other. The lovers in the play must go into nature to discover the true nature of their love. By setting the time period in the 1930's, I have utilized the Swing Era and the Great Depression, a period in our history which points up great discrepancies between the classes. When the out-of-work tradesmen become desperate for money, they are reduced to putting on a play for a Mafia don named Theseus. In the meantime, the young lovers express their rebelliousness in the "degenerate" moves of Swing. Also, this time period points up a stylistic discovery: Utilizing confused sexual roles, the rich hobnobbing with the poor, and extraordinary twists in the plot, *Midsummer* is really a screwball comedy, in the grand style of *My Man Godfrey, On the Twentieth Century*, and *Bringing Up Baby* – all of which burst on the scene in the 1930's.

On the other hand, the spirit/nature world must be completely different from this. What an incredible miracle Central Park is - a plot of open ground 843 acres large preserved for a hundred years within a city of concrete! In looking at the spirits as parts of nature (Shakespeare names Titania's train after elements of nature), I assumed that they could seep out of the earth of Central Park. And what a powerful image it is to picture spirits running around that park. I decided to express them through the nature magic of Native Americans from that region the Lenapé, or Delaware tribe. All of the choices for the spirits are inspired by Lenape traditions that have been exhaustively researched and for which we have received permission from the present Oklahoma Delaware (Lenapé) Tribe. (For a complete research paper on all of these Native American choices, please stop at the Box Office or concession stand.) These are not human tribesmen but spirits, so a great deal of our own imagination as well as Lenape tradition had to go into the work. Lenapé-inspired masks are utilized for spells and dance and to hide from mortals. All of the dances and the songs sung during them are authentic Lenapé.

Welcome to our world: a world of swing dance, the Mafia, and a Central Park swarming with Native American spirits. I hope you enjoy and understand Shakespeare's words more in this uniquely American world. I want to thank the cast, crew and designers for going above and beyond the call of duty not only to illuminate Shakespeare's words but to embrace and expand the magic of this play.

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

Though it has been occupied and claimed for 200 years by the United States, it is still our land, and we Lenapé are still here today. We never left....There is much that is wrong in the land, much that should not be here. And so it is, we eastern Lenapé are as strangers in our land, surrounded by a culture directly at odds with our philosophy, our spirituality and traditions. So, for now, we must live in two worlds, with one foot in and one foot out, and the trick is learning to balance the two without falling flat on our faces.
